THE WIGGLESWORTH BUILDING IN SPRINGFIELD APPROVED FOR NOMINATION TO THE NATIONAL REGISTER OF HISTORIC PLACES

Secretary of the Commonwealth William F. Galvin has announced that the Massachusetts Historical Commission approved the Wigglesworth Building in Springfield for nomination to the National Register of Historic Places at its March 13, 2019 meeting. The nomination will now be submitted to the National Register of Historic Places at the National Park Service for final consideration and designation.

“The Massachusetts Historical Commission is dedicated to preserving the Commonwealth’s rich historic, architectural, archaeological, and cultural resources,” Secretary Galvin said. “The Wigglesworth Building is a 1917 apartment building in the Old Hill neighborhood of Springfield along the old Boston Post Road, still a major east-west artery through Springfield. The rehabilitation of it and the nearby St. James Apartments provide highly visible preservation success stories for the city.”

The Wigglesworth Building is one of six historic resources around the Commonwealth approved for nomination to the National Register by the Massachusetts Historical Commission at this meeting. Galvin serves as chair of the 17-member board, which meets regularly and considers historic resources eligible for the National Register four times per year.

The Wigglesworth Building was constructed in 1917 and is a well-preserved, representative example of Classical Revival-style apartment buildings. Designed by Holyoke-based architect Lyman Howes and built of red brick, it is particularly notable for its cast-stone trim and corner tower adorned with lancet arches.

The Wigglesworth was constructed as part of the building boom in Springfield at the turn of the 20th century due to the large influx of immigrants arriving in the city to work at the Springfield Armory and the automobile and textile industries. It was recently rehabilitated with the support of state and federal historic tax credits for continued use as affordable housing.
